# INDEPENDENCE DAY

Most of us grew up at a time when the Episcopal Church was seen as the church of the establishment in the United States. You may remember the nickname, "The Republican

Party at Prayer." As a result, it's easy to imagine that we Episcopalians have always had a very close association with Independence Day. I served a church in Connecticut that had an annual July 4<sup>th</sup> liturgy using the 1662 Book of Common Prayer, with the idea that they would pray just as all the Anglicans (like George Washington) did on July 4, 1776. It was a lovely idea, but the reality was that by the start of the War of Independence, only two Anglican churches in Connecticut were still in operation – not including the one I was serving. Most Anglican clergy, being loyal to the Crown, had fled to Canada.

It is true that the Episcopal Church only came into existence with the founding of the United States, but tensions between the new church and the new nation took some time to get smoothed out. In 1785, the initial General Convention directed that a service be drawn up to commemorate the signing of the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776, and "That the said form of prayer be used in this Church, on the fourth of July, for ever." The resulting Proposed BCP of 1786 contained "A Form of Prayer and Thanksgiving to Almighty God for the inestimable Blessings of Religious and Civil Liberty" to be used on the Fourth of July.

The first (and fourth) presiding bishop, William White of Pennsylvania, was opposed to the service since many of the clergy had been Loyalists and were against the Revolution. The General Convention of 1789 supported White, and the service was withdrawn from the 1789 BCP. Propers (lessons and prayers) for this day were published in the 1928 BCP, but it was not classified as a major feast. The present Prayer Book lists Independence Day as one of the "Other Major Feasts," a red-letter day. Here is the Collect:

Lord God Almighty, in whose Name the founders of this country won liberty for themselves and for us, and lit the torch of freedom for nations then unborn: Grant that we and all the people of this land may have grace to maintain our liberties in righteousness and peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen.*
