A Grace Note from the Rector March 31, 2022

Dear Ones,

It is with great joy that I can tell you that we will **resume offering the common cup** at the Holy Eucharist as of **this Sunday**! Bishop Jennifer began her letter from March 29 with these words: "When we gather once more, let us be sure that our Eucharistic practices are not only physically safe, but that they also reflect the fullness of the hope and challenge given to us in the sacrament."

Like every pandemic readjustment as we move forward into a "new normal," there are many moving parts. On Sunday, we will make a start by **offering the common cup for sipping the consecrated wine**. (Bishop Jennifer discourages the practice of intinction (dipping) to receive the wine.)

I know that some of you will have questions about all these things. So, please read Bishop Jennifer's letter carefully, it includes some links to very helpful items on history and health. Join us for dinner and beer sampling as we learn about the shared history of beer brewing and the church. **Friday, April 29, 7pm**, at Lutheran Church of the Cross, 2201 N. Wheeling Avenue, Muncie. Today we remember **John Donne** (1573-1631), Priest, Poet, and Preacher. The author of such famous phrases as, "Death, be not proud," "No man is an island," and "for whom the bell tolls" Donne's early career was decidedly secular. At one point he joined with Raleigh and Essex in raids on Cadiz and the Azores, but then faced years of poverty, debt, illness, and frustration. After his ordination in 1615, his reputation as a preacher grew steadily. From 1622 until his death, he was Dean of St. Paul's Cathedral in London, and drew huge crowds to hear him, both at the Cathedral and at Paul's Cross, an outdoor pulpit nearby.

As we approach Holy Week, I thought this excerpt from one of Donne's poems would be timely (I've modernized the spelling).

We think that Paradise and Calvary, Christ's Cross, and Adam's tree, stood in one place; Look, Lord, and find both Adams met in me; As the first Adam's sweat surrounds my face May the last Adam's blood my soul embrace. So, in his purple wrapp'd receive me Lord, By these his thorns give me his other Crown; And as to others' souls I preach'd thy word, Be this my Text, my Sermon to my own. Therefore that he may raise the Lord throws down.
