HAPPY CORPUS CHRISTI

Today, the Thursday after Trinity Sunday is the Feast of Corpus Christi (the Body of Christ), which takes place today, it is a celebration of the sacrament of Holy Communion. Its observance dates from the thirteenth century, when a Belgian beguine, Juliana of Liège (d. 1258), became an advocate for such a feast in response to a vision. The first Feast of Corpus Christi was celebrated at Liège around 1247. Its observance by the western church was commanded by Pope Urban IV in 1264.

In mediaeval times there used to be wonderful processions in which the consecrated elements were taken out of the church on this day and processed on the streets, showing that the Word made flesh was not just in a box labelled 'church' but in our midst, just as he was on the streets of Nazareth and Jerusalem. In England, France and Germany, cycles of mystery plays were performed on this day, dramatizing the history of salvation.

Although the Feast of Corpus Christi is not included in the feasts of our Lord or other feasts of the Episcopal calendar of the church year, it is celebrated by some Episcopal parishes, especially those with an Anglo-Catholic piety.

The BCP provides a revised version of the collect (p 252) composed for the feast by St. Thomas Aquinas (c. 1225-1274).

God our Father, whose Son our Lord Jesus Christ in a wonderful Sacrament has left us a memorial of his passion: Grant us so to venerate the sacred mysteries of his Body and Blood, that we may ever perceive within ourselves the fruit of his redemption; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen*.
