O God, our times are in your hand: Look with favor, we pray, on your servants as they begin another year. Grant that they may grow in wisdom and grace, and strengthen their trust in your goodness all the days of their lives; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Monday is **Labor Day**, the traditional "end of summer" holiday, and **the Church Office will be closed**. When I was a child, it meant the closing of public pools and the start of school. Some of you may remember that it meant hanging up seersucker and white garments until next summer. To those of us who are not manual laborers, it's good to remember Labor Day's deep roots, and its connection to the commitment we make in our Baptismal Covenant to *respect the dignity of every human being*. I invite you to read the Collect (below) slowly, but first, a little history...

Beginning in the 19th century, as the trade union and labor movements grew in response to the Industrial Revolution, different groups chose a variety of days on which to celebrate labor. In the United States, a September holiday called Labor Day was first proposed in the early 1880s, and its popularity spread across the country. In 1894, Congress passed, and President Grover Cleveland signed, a bill recognizing the first Monday of September as Labor Day, making it an official federal holiday. Originally a holiday only for federal workers, Labor Day is now a statuary holiday in all US states, the District of Columbia, and US territories.

Almighty God, you have so linked our lives one with another that all we do affects, for good or ill, all other lives: So guide us in the work we do, that we may do it not for self alone, but for the common good; and, as we seek a proper return for our own labor, make us mindful of the rightful aspirations of other workers, and arouse our concern for those who are out of work; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen
